Southern Methodist's unbeaten place Mustangs galloped to the top of the standings yesterday in The Associated Press weekly poll to de-termine the country's No. 1 college football team.

The Southwest Conference power, which made stubborn Rice a 42-to-21 victim Saturday night, gained 96 first-place nominations from the 246 voting sports critics. Army, leader the past two weeks, dropped to second place despite its 49-0 conquest of Harvard while Oklahoma, the former runner-up, slipped to third, the place formerly held by Southern Methodist. ducer, the Mustangs have romped over five opponents from five different circuits. In order, they have defeated Georgia Tech, Ohio State, Missouri, Oklahoma A. & M. and Rice. In building their unblemished record, the Texans have scored 184 points to 61 for their opponents.
