

# TEXAS AGGIES HELD NEXT TO TENNESSEE

## Advance From Fifth Place to Second in Weekly Football Rating by Experts

### NOTRE DAME CLOSE THIRD

### Southern California Up From No. 7 to Fourth—Michigan Down From No. 2 to Tenth

It was Tennessee against the country today as, for the third week in succession, the unbeaten, untied and unscored-on Volunteers held first place in The Associated Press national football ranking poll.

Major Bob Neyland's powerhouse, which has played only two major games but disposed of its rivals handsomely, polled 81 of 108 first-place votes in the fourth election of the season. This gave the Southeastern Conference leaders, apparently headed for their second perfect campaign, 1,017 points for a walkaway victory.

Texas A. and M., the Southwest Conference pace-setter, moved from fifth to second to beat Notre Dame by 2 points. The Aggies drew six first-place ballots and 787 points to eleven first-place votes and 785 points for the all-winning Irish.

#### Texans Make Best Gain

The Aggies, taking over the spot held by Michigan before its startling defeat by Illinois, made the week's fastest climb along with Southern California. U. S. C. rose to fourth place with 718 points from the No. 7 ranking it held last week.

While Tennessee and Oklahoma stayed in first and sixth place, respectively, other changes in the first ten saw Notre Dame move up one notch as Cornell, third after beating Ohio State, slipped to fifth. Tulane and North Carolina moved up together from eighth and ninth to seventh and eighth; Ohio State climbed back from fourteenth to ninth as Nebraska was consigned to the also-rans and Michigan tumbled from second to tenth.
