Undefeated and Untied Teams Top A. P. Football Ratings-Oklahoma Still Third

Southern Methodist and Army are first and second again this week in The Associated Press football poll.

These two unbeaten, untied leaders for National honors go against what stack up as their toughest assignments of the season in Sat-

urday's games. S. M. U.'s swift-striking Mus-stangs, who have rolled up 184 points against five foes, will meet a big, fast Texas team at Austin. Texas' only defeat was by 14-13

Texas' only defeat was by 14-13 Texas' only defeat was by 14-13 to Oklahoma. Army will risk a 25-game un-beaten streak against formidable Pennsylvania, defeated only by California and 30-7 conqueror of Navy last Saturday. The game will be at Philadelphia. The S. M. U.-Texas game is the only one matching two members of college football's first ten, chosen for the fifth week yesterday by the nation's sports writers and broad-casters. Texas is No. 7. Here is the new ranking: S. M. U., Army, Oklahoma, Ohio State, Kentucky, California, Texas, Miami (Fla.), Princeton and Il-linois.

linois. Ohio State leaped from sixth to fourth on the strength of its 83-21 rout of Iowa, dropping Kentucky and California down a notch. Texas held firm at the seventh slot and three new teams moved in below, replacing Tennessee, Northwestern and Cornell. Tennessee wasn't impressive in

shading Washington and Lee, 27-20. Northwestern and Cornell fell from unbeaten ranks. Oklahoma, which with S. M. U. and Army compose football's seem-ingly irreplaceable "big three," should breeze to a new modern winning record of twenty-seven games against Colorado.

Ohio State can expect a sus-afternoon against Northwestern while California meets once-beaten Washington in the game that may decide the Rose Bowl host. S. M. U. gained favor by being idle last week, polling 153 first-place votes and a total of 2,574 points on the basis of 10 for a No. 1 vote, 9 for No. 2, and so on. Armv got 34 first-place votes, 50 No. 1 vote, 9 for No. 2, and so on. Army got 34 first-place votes, 50 fewer than a week ago despite its 34-0 victory over Columbia. Okla-homa got 25, Ohio State received 30, Kentucky 17 and Miami of Florida 12.
