Yale, replacing Dartmouth as the highest ranked "ivy league" entry, ends its season against Harvard Saturday in what promises to be a close duel. Stanford's challenge to California's coast leadership, and with it the Rose Bowl nomination, is emphasized by this week's voting. Previously unranked, Stanford was rated thirteenth by the latest consensus, just below Nebraska and Notre Dame. The Indians play California on Saturday.
