NOTRE DAME FIRST IN FOOTBALL POLL

Irish Get Total of 933 Points From Writers-Michigan 2d -Army is Rated No. 5

Notre Dame, Michigan and Texas are the big three in college football at this early stage of the 1947 campaign in the opinoin of more

campaign in the opinoin of more than a hundred sports writers who voted yesterday in the first Associated Press poll of the season to select the top ten teams.

Although both Michigan and Texas sport more impressive records than Notre Dame, the experts placed Coach Frank Leahy's Fighting Irish at the top of the list on the strength of their 40-6 triumph over Pittsburgh in their only performance to date.

Notre Dame held the No. 1 posi-

Notre Dame held the No. 1 position in the final poll of 1946, breaking Army's two-year grip on that distinction, and the writers demonstrated. strated their faith in Leahy's abil-ity to build another national cham-pion by reserving the top spot for his South Bend club.

Listed on 102 Ballots.

Fifty-two of the 103 writers participating in the first of the season's weekly polls gave Notre
Dame their first-place votes and
twenty-four others ranked it second. The Irish were listed on every ballot except one and were no lower than sixth on any of them.

The Irish, who meet Purdue this week, compiled a total of 933 points

week, compiled a total of 933 points on the basis of 10 points for a first-place vote, 9 for second, etc.

Michigan, which crushed Stanford, 49-13, after swamping Michigan State in its opener, was awarded the No. 2 spot. Texas, the No. 1 team in the first poll a year ago but fifteenth at the end of the season, landed the third position. Georgia Tech, unbeaten and unscored on in two starts, was named No. 4, just ahead of Army, which boasts a similar record, 542 points to 533. to 533.

One First-Place Vote

The Cadets, runners-up in the final 1946 poll, drew only one firstfinal 1946 poll, drew only one first-place vote despite the extension of its unbeaten string to thirty games, Georgia Tech, which finished in eleventh place last year, was placed first on three ballots.
