Minnesota and Virginia are the only newcomers, displacing beaten Baylor, which lost its first game to Texas, 20-0, and Southern Methodist, held to a surprising 27-27 tie by the Texas Aggies. The Minnesota Gophers' 55-7 romp over supposedly strong Iowa gave them a big lift and Virginia's convincing 26-14 decision over Penn lifted the unbeaten Cavaliers into the top ten.
