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The ranking list clearly points to the best intersectional matches, with Pittsburgh a heavy choice to play in the Sugar Bowl, at New Orleans, against the Southern team that doesn't go to Pasadena to meet Washington. Big Ten regulations prevent Minnesota from considering any post-season competition.

Fordham lost prestige at the close of the season, falling from third place to fifteenth within the past two weeks, but the East generally made a strong showing, placing seven teams among the twenty listed in the final ranking. Pennsylvania. Yale and Dartmouth represent the "Ivy League."
