ARMY RATED BEST IN NATIONAL POLL

Army's great fullback team, unbeaten and untied the last two years, was unanimously acclaimed yesterday by sports writers as the best college eleven in the country.

Following on the heels of the cadets' 32-13 victory over Navy on Saturday, all of the 116 scribes participating in the final Associated Press weekly poll put Army first. Most of them asserted the cadets were in a class by themselves. The cadets thus polled a

perfect 1,160 points.

Navy's fine showing against the West Pointers after the first quarter brought the middles sufficient second and third place votes to edge Alabama's Rose Bowl-bound team out of the runner-up spot. The middles finished with 942 points to Alabama's 932.
