Irish Remain Choice as Best Eleven of Nation in Final Associated Press Poll

Notre Dame didn't play Saturday, but for the third straight week Elmer Layden's greatest eleven tops The Associated Press football poll. Of the ninety writers participating in the final selection, forty-eight chose Notre Dame as the nation's best team and the men from South Bend rolled up a total of 823 points. This was enough to beat out Texas This was enough to beat out Texas Christian and Duke, two elevens that performed admirably in Satur-day's battles. The Horned Frogs, Christian and Duke, two elevens who downed Southern Methodist in their final and won the Southwest Conference title, wound up second, with twenty-three first-place votes and 782 poins. Duke ended its un-beaten, untied and unscored upon and 782 poins. Duke ended its un-beaten, untied and unscored upon season by downing Pitt by a touchdown, the most signal victory of a not-too-strenuous schedule. The Blue Devils had fifteen first-place The votes and 733 points.

Pitt Éleven Drops

The remainder of the first ten held fairly true to form. Tennessee held fourth place, Oklahoma rose from sixth to fifth and Carnegie stepped from seventh to sixth this week. Pitt fell to seventh from fifth posi-tion and Southern California and Holy Cross entered the first ten on significant wallopings of U. C. L. A. and Boston College. Minnesota dropped from eighth to tenth. dropped from eighth to tenth.
