ARMY GAINS LEAD IN FOOTBALL POLL

Notre Dame Displaced at Top in National Rankings First Time in 14 Tabulations

Army's unbeaten football horde replaced Notre Dame as the kingpin in the collegiate world in a poll of 101 sports writers by The Associated Press yesterday.

The cadets were marked No. 1 on 41 ballots and drew enough attention in the other berths to pile up 898 points. Notre Dame, listed on top by only fifteen writers, was placed on every one of the ballots to be second, exactly 100 points behind Army.

It marked the first time in fourteen tabulations that the Irish, who had a rugged time Saturday

teen tabulations that the Irish, who had a rugged time Saturday turning back Illinois, 13 to 7, were not on top. In one mid-season canvass during the 1943 campaign they garnered every first-place vote. A week earlier the South Bend eleven, on top by 8 points, led in the voting for first with 40 such markings to 30 for Army.

The cadets, who came from behind a 7-to-6 score at the half to subdue Duke, 26 to 7, Saturday, also were listed on every ballot this week. They received 32 nominations for second, 18 for third, 4 for fouth, 3 for fifth, 2 for seventh and 1 for ninth. The two leaders will meet in the Yankee Stadium on Nov. 11.

Ohio State's all-civilian Ohio State's all-civilian oufit garnered seventeen designations as the country's best and moved into third place with 772 points, shoving the potent Randolph Field aggregation to fourth with 716. The Texas fliers were first on eighteen ballots. Both the third and fourth teams drew more first-place votes than did the Irish.
