MICHIGAN REGAINS **1ST PLACE IN POLL**

Notre Dame is Rated Second, S. M. U. Third by Votes of 246 Football Writers

Coach Fritz Crisler's Michigan team was rated the nation's great-est gridiron machine yesterday in the weekly poll by The Associated Press with Notre Dame second and Southern Methodist University Southern Methodist University third. The largest number of football writers ever to take part in an Associated Press poll—246 e part participated.

Having soared to the top at this late stage of the game, the Wolver-lies appear almost certain to re-main there through their regular main there through their regular season finale against Ohio State this week and to carry a proud record into the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day their

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Of the bumper crop of voters, 140 chose Michigan as the country's No. 1 outfit, while eightyseven stuck with Notre Dame as the best and nine picked Southern Methodist. Penn State (6), Southern California (3), and North Carolina (1) were the only other teams to gain a vote for first place. The first five are undefeated and untied.

Wolverines Beat Wisconsin

What obviously influenced the press box observers was Michigan's 40-6 victory over a strong Wisconsin eleven while Notre Dame was having its hands full beating an otherwise undistinguished Northwestern team by only 26—19. In the final court of

beating an otherwise undistinguished Northwestern team by only 26—19. In the final count of points, the Wolverines regained the lead over the Fighting Irish by 2,341 to 2,261. Southern Methodist, victor over Arkansas by 14—6, polled 1,801 points.

Alabama's Crimson Tide made the greatest spurt of the week, jumping from fourteenth to eighth place on the strength of its victory over previously unbeaten and untied Georgia Tech. Though idle last week, U. S. C. moved up a notch to fourth place, and Penn State, off its impressive 20-7 victory over Navy, climbed from eighth to fifth. Penn dropped from third to sixth after tying Army 7—7. Texas, beating Texas Christian, 20—0, was voted seventh place.
