ARMY SQUAD DROPS TO FOURTH IN POLL

Oklahoma and California Pass Cadets as Notre Dame Adds to First-Place Crip

Notre Dame, Oklahoma, California and Army continue to be the only "regulars" in college football's first ten,

The seventh weekly Associated Press poll, out yesterday, placed the fearsome foursome at the top again—the only teams that have

ranked every week of the season. For the first time in weeks, though, there is a change even in their order, with Oklahoma and California moving ahead of Army, which lost the grip it had held on second place since Oct. 10. The Black Knights of the Hudson lost favor in their narrow escape past Penn, 14—13. They fell to fourth.

Notre Dame solidified its lead. The Irish received 140 first-place ballots from the 162 sports writers and broadcasters who participated. They rolled up 1,592 points. Bowlbound Oklahoma gained fifteen first-place votes to finish second with 1,298 points.

Ohio State and Southern Methodist are newcomers to the first ten this week, replacing Cornell and Michigan State
