CADETS ARE VOTED OUTSTANDING TEAM

Army, mythical national champion of 1944, is the outstanding college football team at this stage of the present campaign in the opinion of 111 sports experts who participated in the weekly Associated Press poll, now entering its tenth year.

The Cadets, unbeaten since 1943, were rated tops by eighty-six of the voting scribes. Twenty of the remainder put the charges of Col. Earl (Red) Blaik in second place, with the rest of the ballots dropping them in either third or fifth position.

Giving 10 points for each firstplace vote, 9 for each second and 8 for third, the Cadets gathered 1,076 points.

Navy, which gave Army its toughest struggle a year ago and looms as the only one to test them this fall, was ranked second with 955 points, drawing fourteen votes for first place.
