MICHIGAN REMAINS AT TOP IN AP POLL

First 5 Elevens Unchanged as Notre Dame, North Carolina, California, Army Follow

With Michigan and Notre Dame running one, two among the na-tion's college gridiron leaders for the second straight year, other all-victorious outfits probably are victorious outfits probably are wondering what they have to do to convince the experts that their records are just as good.

Mighty Michigan strengthened its position as top team in the weekly poll of The Associated Press yesterday after hurdling Minnesota, 27—14, Saturday for its nineteenth straight triumph and fifth this season.

Notre Dame was retained in second place by the consensus, which also lined up the next five teams in the exact positions they had held a week ago. All of them still sported spotless records.

Michigan landed the No. 1 spot on 117 of the 206 ballots cast, compared with 74 of a possible 148 first place votes last week. North Carolina received 46 votes for first place, an increase of 14, but remained in third place behind Notre Dame, which drew only 19 ballots for the No. 1 spot.

California, which blanked Washington, 21—0, for its sixth straight victory, collected thirteen first-place votes but couldn't climb out of the No. 4 spot. Army had to remain satisfied with its fifth-place rating, although the cadets stopped hitherto unbeaten Cornell,

place rating, although the cadets stopped hitherto unbeaten Cornell, 27—6, for their fifth in a row and clearly established themselves as

clearly established themselves as the cream of the East.
On the basis of 10 points for a first-place vote, 9 for second and so on, down to 1 for tenth, Michi-gan racked up 1,885 points, Notre Dame 1,615, North Carolina 1,568, California 1,239 and Army 1,214. California 1,239 and Army 1,214. Georgia Tech, which crushed Florida, 42—7, stayed in the sixth slot and received only one first-place vote, despite its 5-0 record. Pennsylvania got no first-place votes after its narrow 20-14 triumph over Navy but clung to the No. 7 spot.

Only team to drop out of the top ten was Penn State, which slumped to twelfth after being tied by

Michigan State, 14-14.
