Wildcats Top Gophers

Northwestern Loses Ground, but Retains National Prestige

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. (#)—By margin almost as slender as the Minnesota victory that hoisted them to the top, Northwestern's Wildcats led the Gophers today for the second successive week in the national college football ranking poll conducted by the Associated Press.

Suffering a slight loss of pres sinering a signitive struggle by their hard struggle against the much-kicked-around Wisconsin Badgers, the Wildcats polled 435 out of a possible total of 470 votes against 419 for Minnesota. Fordham tightened its grip on third place and Rose Bowl consideration, its total swelling to 318 as the result of its convincing triumph over Purdue. due.

Last week, the Wildcats polled 412 out of a possible 430 votes to Minnesota's 371 and Fordham's 227.

Marquette, held to a one point victory by Creighton College of Omaha Saturday, suffered the biggest loss as the ballots poured in from football writers over scattered sections of the nation, dropping from fourth place to eighth. Alabama, decisive victor over Tulane, leaped from fourteenth to fourth position. The ballots were geographically divided as follows: East, 21; Middile West, 12; South, 6; Southwest, 4; Rocky Mountain district, 1; and Far West, 3.
