Notre Dame Climbs Over T. C. U. To Top of Weekly Gridiron Poll

South Bend Team Gets 60 of 92 Votes for First—Tennessee Third, Duke Fourth

Cornell Vaults From 20th to 8th The mightiest Notre Dame foot ally got its best four backs together ball team since the halcyon days and ran all over Syracuse. of the late great Knute Rockne yesterday took over the national leadership in the fifth Associated Press pell of sports writers.

The Irish, who bagged their seventh major victory Saturday, rolled up 887 points to lead Texas Chris-tian University, the first team a week ago, by 101 points. Sixty of the ninety-two sports writers who participated in the poll named Notre Dame as their No. 1 eleven.

The rise of the Irish from second to first place was accompanied by other upheavals. Tennessee, Southeastern Conference leader, moved from fourth to third, and Duke, triumphant over Syracuse in its Northern invasion, rose from seventh to fourth. Unbeaten Oklahoma jumped from tenth to seventh and Cornell, which finally harnessed its manpower against Dartmouth, made the poll's biggest gain, a spurt from twentieth to eighth.
